descriptions of research in progress, reviews of research, book reviews, letters, and
announcements of jobs, funding, or events judged to be of interest to researchers in
professions education. Publication of such items is dependent on available space.

Networking Opportunities

The purpose of the Committee on Diversity and Equity (CoDE) is to welcome investigations that target issues of diversity and equity and to encourage use of multiple research paradigms. CoDE seeks to increase participation in the Division by persons of all demographic groups and by educators from every professional field.

The goals of the Mentoring Committee are to: (1) welcome junior scholars to the division and to connect them with other members, especially senior scholars who share their interests; (2) provide tips to help scholars prepare effective proposals and deliver successful paper, poster, and roundtable presentations.

The three Communities—Teaching and Learning, Assessment, and Professional Development—provide opportunities for Division members with shared areas of interest to collaborate, develop mentor/mentee relationships, and to develop professional connections with other AREA Divisions with shared interests.

The Division I Twitter feed (http://www.twitter.com/#!/AERADivisionI), which began in 2011, now has 136 followers. This feed will be used to update members on preparations for the 2015 Annual Meeting.

Suggestions for Getting the Most from the AERA Annual Meeting

Familiarize yourself with the organization of AERA, which includes 12 divisions and nearly 160 Special Interest Groups (or SIGs)

- Prior to the meeting, familiarize yourself with all the different acronyms, decide on which group(s) align best with your professional interests
- Seek out peer mentoring; discuss the program with an experienced AERA attendee
- Pick one division/group and track its schedule, choosing among those offerings

Make a schedule for yourself in advance

- Write an action plan for your activities at the meeting
- Mix up the types of presentations you attend

AERA session formats

- **Paper Session** Promote dissemination and discussion of completed research. Sessions include four to five presenters who provide a 10-12 minute summary of their research paper, a moderator, and a discussant whose responsibility is to comment on key issues raised and generate discussion among presenters and the audience.
- **Symposium** An opportunity to explore contrasting views on current research issues. Symposia sessions are intended to provide diverse perspectives of research approaches, questions, methods and/or applications in medical education. Sessions are 1.5 hours or two hours long, depending upon the number of presenters.
- **Roundtable Session** Papers are grouped into tables with three to five papers per table, clustered around shared interests. A designated chair who is knowledgeable about the research area facilitates interaction and participation.
- **Poster session** Individual presenters set up displays representing their papers in a large area with other presenters. As informal, 90-minute sessions, poster sessions are a good opportunity to talk one-on-one with colleagues whose interests are similar to yours.

- **Structured Poster Session** A chair provides an introduction to 6----12 poster presentations that are conceptually linked, with the majority of time devoted to direct discussion between attendees and poster presenters. Discussants are optional.
- Working Group Roundtable Designed to bring 3----6 individual researchers or teams of researchers who are working on a common set of research issues, problems or themes together for discussion. All presenters prepare a brief paper or commentary that frames the issue or problem they wish to examine.
- Demonstration/Performance To showcase a particular technique, tool or method, participants prepare a brief commentary addressing what the performance or demonstration is, what it conveys, and what has been learned or could be learned through that method.
- Off-Site Visit Offers participants site---- specific learning, taking advantage of the unique attributes of the city in which the Annual Meeting takes place, and connecting researchers with concrete examples of relevant work.
- **Workshop** An opportunity to exchange information or work on a common problem, project, or shared interest. Presentations are brief, allowing time for reflective discussion and interaction. May require registration in advance of the meeting.

Things to try at AERA

- AERA Welcoming Orientation for New Members and First-Time Attendees
- Fireside Chat, for junior scholars

Things to follow up on

• Find sessions of specific speakers or topics of interest

Things to share

- Identify topics that others at your institution may benefit from, e.g., updates in high---- stakes examination
- Before you book your flights, review the program: Bookmark sessions you want to attend so that you can schedule your time effectively (see meeting program and PERQ for Division I program)
- The meeting program is complicated but contains all you need: schedule and session locations are organized by day. For session details, sort the electronic document via the "Program by Unit", and click on "Division."
- Acknowledge to yourself that it is impossible to attend everything! Be strategic and organized in your planning
- Check locations ahead of time as you may need to plan to travel between buildings
- There's a lot of walking involved. Plan accordingly and dress comfortably!

Plan and organize a system with colleagues in advance

- Meet briefly during the meeting to touch base.
- Divide and conquer with other colleagues from your institution; discussing sessions afterward allows you to experience more of the meeting

Focus on areas of interest which align with your work

- Pick one or two topics pertinent to your academic role and focus on developments in those areas
- Prioritize what you want from the meeting: new knowledge, skills, resources, networking
- Frame your goals; identify the top 3-5 things you'd like to learn more about at the meeting
- If you want to meet people in your field attend sessions within those domains; introduce yourself to the presenter(s) at the end of the session
- Bring one or two work challenges/questions and ask people you meet about them
- If there is a researcher/educator of particular interest, check if/ when that person is presenting
- Plan ahead and schedule time on your calendar after the meeting to follow-up on what you learned, make contacts and/or initiate projects

Take the time to branch out and learn about other areas of education

- Sample topics you are unfamiliar with as an enrichment activity; try a variety of "interactive" formats
- Expand your mind and breadth by attending at least one session on a topic you know nothing about
- Attend sessions offered by other Divisions and SIGs, for example:
