Report from the 2010 Program Committee Co-Chairs

An outstanding Division E program in Denver included a total 17 sessions aligned with the 2010 AERA convention theme *Understanding Complex Ecologies in a Changing World.* These included two poster sessions (one each for counseling and for human development), symposia, paper sessions, and round tables. Titles for those sessions included:

- Cultivating Tolerance:
 Developing Moral Sensitivities,
 Competences and Attitudes for a Democratic Society;
- Developing Together: The Role of Social Relationships in Schools
- Fathers and Mothers: Parental Involvement in Diverse Contexts;
- Identity Development Among Ethnic Minority Adolescents;
- Mental Health and Academic Outcomes Among Children and Adolescents;
- Teachers' Views of Social Justice and Their Role in Promoting Student Development: Interdisciplinary Perspectives;
- Client Characteristics and Behaviors;
- Counseling Diverse Populations;
- Measurement of Counseling Related Constructs;
- Moving a Profession Forward to Implement 21st Century School Counseling Models;

- School Counseling: Consumer Perceptions, Expert Judgment about Role, and Demonstrated Effectiveness;
- STEM Career Development: Lessons Learned from the NSF ITEST program

Also, Cynthia Hudley presented her Vice Presidential address, *The Developmental Niche: Understanding Human Development in Cultural Context.*Finally, the Division hosted a *Night at the Museum* event, and presented separate preconference seminars for graduate students and new faculty.

The 2011 conference theme, Inciting the Social Imagination: Education Research for the Public Good, suited for our Division as it's at the heart of much of our work.

The submission deadline is July 15th again this year and we eagerly await a strong group of submissions.

The 2011 convention will be in the "Big Easy," which follows the bend of the Mississippi River and which has faced much adversity. New Orleans continues to recover from hurricanes Katrina and Rita, and now faces a new challenge with the Gulf Coast oil spill. The city remains vibrant, spirited, and its streets resound with music. In New Orleans, convention sessions and activities will be held at the convention hotels.

Affirmative Action

Greetings Division E Members,

As we prepare for the 2011 meeting in New Orleans, Louisiana, I invite you to join the Division E Affirmative Action Committee. As noted in the Affirmative Action Officer Charge (approved by AERA Council, June, 2001), the Affirmative Action Committee aims to address equity and diversity within the program, recruitment and nominating processes, and reporting and communication functions within the Division.

The Division Affirmative Action Committee focuses on:

- recommending annual program offerings related to affirmative action for the Division;
- promoting and monitoring equity in the review process and consideration of proposals for the annual program;
- encouraging diversity in reviews, presenters, chairs, and discussants;
- collaborating with the Division Vice President on an annual affirmative action report;
- devising strategies to recruit a more diverse membership; and
- contributing names and supporting documentation for the nomination and appointment process.

Proposal Submission Tips

Program planning begins shortly after the submission deadline. Below are a few basic tips for how to make sure your proposal is given full consideration for inclusion in the program:

- Be inclusive when selecting session format, this gives program officers more flexibility by allowing posters to be used to complete a panel session or papers to be presented as posters when limited panel sessions are full.
- Remember to remove any identifying information from your submission paper. Some divisions disregard unblind submissions entirely.
- Make sure that you are submitting a Division or Special Interest Group that is appropriate for your work. Consider even adding a note of additional groups to forward your work to should your proposal not be found appropriate for the one you submitted to or if space does not allow inclusion.
- Include keywords for your proposal. This may help program officers to build connections between your work and others' for a coherent program.

Finally, don't forget to volunteer to serve on a review panel. Our program is only as strong as are our reviewers. See you in New Orleans!
